



CHOL Web updates

We are always delighted when people who have been lovingly writing stories or family memoirs suddenly discover CHOL. They seem so relieved to find the ideal place to post their writings in a place where it is accessible to all who may be interested. All these, re-imagine the picture of Jewish life in Southern Africa in the 20th century. This month we have been pleased to post:



Louis and Elizabeth (Betsy) Sarembock – the story of Elizabeth de Winter born in Rotterdam in 1892, written by Milla Wolman, 16, Betsy's great-granddaughter in Sydney. Betsy came to South Africa with her family in 1906 aged 14. She met her husband-to-be the farmer Louis Sarembock when she was 17 and they married soon after and lived on his farm in the beautiful area of Ceres in the Western Cape. Louis Sarembock and his brothers Joseph and Jack were pioneers in the scientific growing of apples and other deciduous fruit in

South Africa. In the early 1900s, they imported fruit and fruit trees from New Zealand, Australia, Canada and California. They laid out their farms near Ceres and learned the methods of deciduous storage and marketing that set an example to other fruit farmers. It is largely thanks to them that Ceres became the largest producer and exporter of South African deciduous fruit. Sadly, Louis died suddenly in 1929. Betsy returned to Holland where she married again and was caught up in hiding there during WW2. Dr Solly Kaye (1922 – 2012) and family – A Family memoir by his daughter Dr Brenda Kerbel of Newton, Mass. Graduating from UCT in 1946, he started as a General Practitioner in District Six for 10 years. In 1960, he moved his practice to the family home in Vredehoek, Cape Town where, for decades to come, he devotedly treated patients from all over. Brenda, her older brother Trevor, as well as her husband, Richard Kerbel, also qualified in medicine at UCT.

Years later, her son, Russell, studied medicine in Boston. The memoir covers the unsettled period of brutal apartheid and army service in South Africa in the 1970s, that drove many young professionals to emigrate. She describes the great opportunities as well as the heartache and difficulties of so many of her generation at leaving ageing parents behind and of their own children growing up far from their loving grandparents.
